WHAT IS TITLE IX?

Title IX is the federal law passed in 1972 that prohibits discrimination in education settings based on sex. Discrimination based on sex includes a wide variety of sexual misconduct, including sexual harassment, sexual assault, rape, domestic violence, dat

medical care by treating injuries and offering information about sexually transmitted infections and pregnancy.

3. Criminal complaint
